Having a job that allows me the flex time to go on a mission trip and still watch sports makes me see how truly blessed I am and what a charmed life I lead.







Under Secondary Roads update, Engineer Albert updated the Board on maintenance and projects. Under new business, motion by Rob-

inson, second by Schmid to schedule public hearing for FY 2021-2022 budget amendment on May 24, 2022 at 8:45 a.m. Roll call: Yes: Peterson, Cooper, Robinson, Schmid, Olson. No: None. Motion carried.

Current budget and amendments were discussed. Auditor Burke distributed current expense reports. Contributions to Montgomery County Economic Development (MCDC) and Montgomery County Recreational

Trails were discussed. Auditor Burke requested input from the Board for the upcoming 21-22 budget amendment. She explained that the County did not receive invoices from MCDC in the FY 2020-2021; therefore, a portion of the contribution in the amount of \$20,000 was not paid to MCDC that year. Auditor Burke distributed information from Ann Carder of MCDC requesting an additional \$20,000 from the County to be paid this fiscal year (FY 21-22). Burke also distributed expense detail reports consisting of the previous years contributions to MCDC. Because this is not in the budget, Burke said an amendment had to be done to fulfill this request of \$20,000. 


Stanton art showcase





Roadway safety considerations for farm equipment operators

Warmer temperatures and drier conditions are in the forecast and farmers will soon be in the fields in full force. That means more equipment will be on the roadways in the coming days.

Moving farm equipment on public roads can be a dangerous activity. Farm operators need to drive defensively and remain alert every second they are

Steven Freeman, a professor in agricultural systems and bioengineering at Iowa State University, reminds equipment operators of some important dos and don'ts this spring.

Additional information is also available in the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach publication "Safely Sharing the Road with Farm Vehicles.'

Injuries can happen when farm equipment operators:

Lack the experience to handle the heavy, slowmoving machinery.

Drive too fast, particularly when pulling a heavy load or turning.

Drive partially over the centerline.

Drive partially on the shoulder, and partially on the main road surface.

Run into a tree or other fixed object.

A major reason for farm machinery incidents on public roads is the difference in speed between automobiles and agricultural equipment. Motorists approach the slow moving farm equipment so quickly that they only have a few seconds to iden-



tify the hazard and react appropriately.

"That's why it is so important for farm equipment to be highly visible and properly identified with a slow moving vehicle sign which must be visible from 500 feet away," said Steven Freeman, professor in agricultural and biosystems engineering at Iowa State University. "SMV signs must be kept clean, and faded or damaged signs should be replaced."

Tractors must be equipped with lights if operated on public roads at night, or under conditions of reduced visibility. Highway travel requires headlights, red taillights and reflectors. Flashing amber lights provide day and night warning to traffic approaching from either direction. The more highly visible the equipment is, the better.

Check everything before heading out Freeman reminds farm equipment operators equipment before heading onto the road. Use safety-

type hitch pins, and make sure they are securely fastened.

A safety chain must

extend from the tractor to the frame of the Check all tires (on both tractor and towed

equipment) for air pressure, cuts and bumps. Always lock brake pedals together for road travel. Sudden braking on one wheel only at high speed could put the tractor into a dangerous skid. Rearview mirrors, flares and fire extinguishers

towed equipment.

should be standard equipment for tractors that are frequently driven on public roads. Confirm that all lights are operating properly.

Make sure that the SMV sign is clean, unfaded

and properly mounted. Check towed equipment. Any load should be balanced and properly secured. Make sure the towed load is light enough for the tractor to handle safely. Heavy wagons should be equipped with independent brakes.

Farm machinery operators can make road to perform a travel safer for themselves and others by taking complete check of both the tracthe following precautions.

> Avoid busy roads whenever possible, even if travel time will be longer.

Travel at a speed that will allow you to maintain

full control at all times. Slow down when making turns or rounding

Observe road travel precautions listed in operator manuals. Some tractors freewheel in higher gears. This can be very dangerous when coming down a hill. Use lower gear ranges when climbing

or descending hills. If possible, drive on the shoulder of a paved highway. However, don't drive partly on the shoulder and partly on the paved lane.

Stay alert for hazards such as soft shoulders, narrow bridges, loose gravel, bumps, potholes and deep ruts.

When cars are lined up behind you, and a suitable shoulder is available, pull over to let the

If possible, move equipment in daylight during periods of light traffic.

Travel after dark only if absolutely necessary. Remember that you need proper lighting for night

Don't take chances by pulling onto a road in front of moving traffic. Enter and exit roadways very cautiously if your view is obstructed.

Obey traffic laws and signs. Courtesy is a key component of road safety.

Popular graduation traditions

Graduation is steeped in tradition. Come the day of graduation, many grads-to-be might be focusing on receiving their diplomas and then celebrating after the ceremony. The hard work students put in affords them every right to celebrate once they're officially anointed as new grads, but before the party begins it can be fun to reflect on the many traditions associated with graduation ceremonies.

Cap and gown

Graduation ceremonies simply wouldn't be the same without caps and gowns. The tradition is anything but new, as Columbia University notes caps and gowns have been linked to academia since the 12th century. Back then, students wore gowns and hoods to emulate the clergy who taught them, but also to stay warm. Many universities dressed their scholars in gowns from the 1700s onward. In 1786, one school, Brown University, even mandated that degree candidates be clad in flowing robes and caps at commencement ceremonies. Though educators and students may no longer wear caps and gowns when attending class or around campus, the tradition of doing so at commencement ceremonies has endured.

Tassel turning

The tradition of turning the tassel does not have the lengthy received their degrees during the ceremony. The turn is symbolic of history of the cap and gown, dating back only decades rather than centuries. Graduates typically turn the tassels after everyone has



their transition from student to graduate. Tassels start on the right for high school students and college undergraduates and are then turned

to the left, while recipients of master's degrees and doctorates keep their tassels on the left throughout the commencement ceremonies.

Tossing caps in the air

The tossing of graduation caps in the air is believed to date back more than 100 years. Prior to 1912, graduates of the United States Naval Academy had to serve as midshipmen for two years before they were commissioned as officers. As a result, they still needed their graduation caps. But beginning with the class of 1912, graduates were automatically commissioned as officers, so they no longer needed their hats. That led the graduates to throw them in the air, thus beginning one of the more fun and photo-worthy graduation traditions.

"Pomp and Circumstance"

This tradition marked by the playing of "Pomp and Circumstance" is rooted in the work of William Shakespeare, which makes it seem like a perfect fit for graduation ceremonies. Sir Edward Elgar composed "Pomp and Circumstance" in 1901 and the title for the song was inspired by a line in the bard's "Othello." Elgar received an honorary degree from Yale University in 1905, and during that ceremony "Pomp and Circumstance" was played. The song apparently made a strong impression, as it soon began to be played at various commencement ceremonies, a tradition that continues today.
