SIMPLE WAYS TO THANK LOCAL NURSES

Nurses have long been unsung heroes of the medical community. But that tide began to turn in 2020 as the world confronted the COVID-19 pandemic and realized just how invaluable nurses are to public health.

According to the American Nurses Association, nearly 400 nurses in the United States died as a result of COVID-19 within eight months of a pandemic being declared in America. Globally, data from the International Council of Nurses indicated that roughly 1,500 nurses lost their lives to COVID-19 by the end of October 2020.

That data is sobering and serves as a reminder that nurses put their lives on the line each day they go to work. Such sacrifices are worthy of widespread support, and there are many ways ordinary citizens can thank nurses working in their communities.

♥ Support efforts to protect nurses. Despite widespread recognition of how vital they are to public health, nurses still may not have unbridled access to personal protective equipment (PPE). An ANA survey of nurses working in various health care settings conducted in fall 2020 found that 42 percent of nurses indicated they were still experiencing widespread or intermittent PPE shortages. In fact, more than half of the 21,000-plus nurses surveyed reported that they were forced to re-use single-use PPE, a practice they said makes them feel unsafe. The public can do its part by urging local lawmakers to support legislation that increases domestic production of PPE so the brave men and women in the nursing profession can

feel safe when doing their jobs.

♥ Give nurses and their families a night off from cooking. Long shifts in stressful situations have taken a toll on nurses and their families. Neighbors can pitch in by offering to cook and deliver meals or pay for takeout for nurses and their families. This simple gesture can provide a much-needed break for nurses and their spouses who have been stretched thin during the pandemic, and it's a great way to remind nurses their heroic efforts are not going unnoticed.

♥ Help out with chores. Before going to the grocery store, text or call a friend or neighbor in the nursing field to see if he or she needs anything from the store. If nurses shop online for their groceries, arrange to pick

them up so nurses can spend more time relaxing at home with their families. During warm weather seasons, offer to mow the lawn or help with leaf pickup.

♥ Offer discounts to nurses in your community. Local business owners can do their part by offering discounts to nurses and other health care professionals in their communities. A 10 percent discount on a restaurant bill or a nursing discount on a fresh bouquet of flowers can lift nurses' spirits and reassure them that their communities are behind them.

Nurses have made immeasurable sacrifices throughout the pandemic. Communities can come together in various and often simple ways to show nurses just how much those sacrifices are appreciated.

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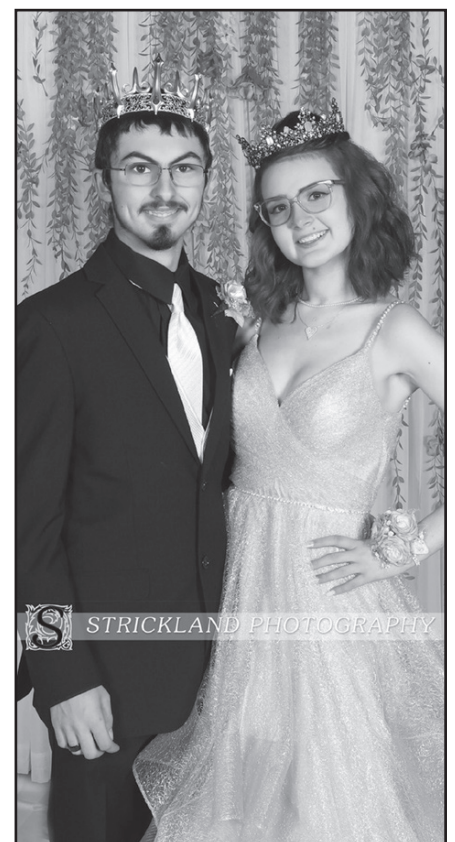

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Following the federal decennial census, and in accordance with Chapter 49 of the Code of Iowa, the Montgomery County Board of Supervisors hereby establish election precinct boundaries as follows:

Precinct One: Point of beginning: Intersection of the Nishnabotna River and Coolbaugh Street (shown as 205th Street outside the corporate city limits), then east on Coolbaugh Street to West 3rd Street, then North on West 3rd Street on-half block to the east-west alley located between Coolbaugh and Reed Street, then east on said alley to West 2nd Street, then north on West 2nd Street to Reed Street, then north on Reed Street to 2nd Street, then north on 2nd Street to Hammond Street, then east on Hammond Street to Boundary Street, then south on Boundary Street to Reed Street, then east on Reed Street to Highland Avenue, then north on Highland Avenue to Hammond Street, then east on Hammond Street to Eastern Avenue, then north on Eastern Avenue to Forest Avenue, then East on Forest Avenue to Red Oak Creek, then northeasterly along Red Oak Creek to 200th Street, then east on 200th Street to L Avenue, then north on L Avenue to 190th Street, then east on 190th Street to M Avenue, then north on M Avenue to the NW Corner of the SW ¼ SW ¼ Section 8-72N-37W of the 5th PM, then east to N Avenue, then north on N Avenue to 140th Street, then east on 140th Street to O Avenue, then south on O Avenue to 210th Street, then west on 210th Street to Tarkio Creek, then following the Tarkio Creek south to 220th Street, then west on 220th Street to 8th Street (AKA Hickory Avenue outside the corporate city limits), then north on 8th Street (AKA Hickory Avenue outside the corporate city limits) to the corporate city limits/ boundaries of Red Oak, then west along the corporate city limits to Hwy. 48, then north on Hwy. 48 following to corporate city limits to Ohio Avenue, then west along the corporate city limits to the Nishnabotna River, then north following the Nishnabotna River along the corporate city limits to the point of beginning.

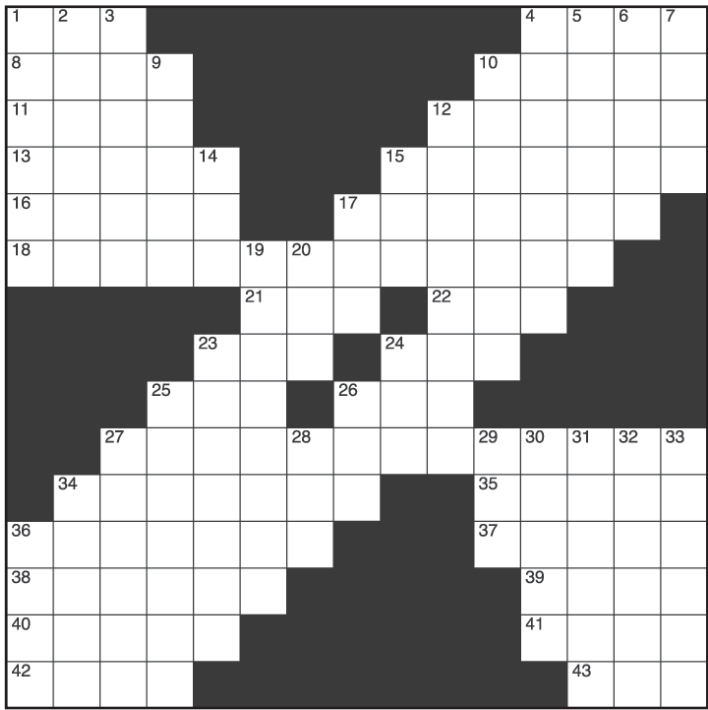
Facilities Assessment and Long-Range Planning
