Tiger football earns third straight shutout

Red Oak volleyball nabs Hawk-10 win

The Red Oak Tigers made a statement on Friday, Sept. 9, as they shut out their third opponent of the season in a 36-0 shutout over Nodaway Valley to move to 3-0 on the season.

"It is a team effort on defense," Red Oak head football coach Michael Nordeen said. "We are able to rotate players to different spots, and we don't miss a beat. We give the guys a lot of freedom to adjust on the fly, and it allows them to play more relaxed. It's fun to work with these guys during the week; the ideas they come up with and adjustments they make during scout, shows the time they are putting into mastering their craft.

"We have also had guys step up in back-up roles that have been huge. Baz Clear, Cyrus Mensen, and Andrew Johnson have stepped up and helped the defense. Having guys like this allows us to give guys breaks and have more gas in our tank when the third and fourth quarter come around."

The game started slowly, and the first quarter was filled with miscues and penalties from both sides. Red Oak's Braden Woods deflected a Wolverine pass on third down to force a punt. The Tigers had a short field and scored on a 29-yard pass from Chase Roeder to Dawson Bond to get the scoring started. Neither team scored in the second quarter and the Tigers took a 7-0 lead into the halftime.

Third quarter scoring included two rushing TDs by Riley Fouts and both PATs, kicked by Dawson Bond, were good. The Tigers entered the fourth quarter leading 21-0.

Woods scored on a 35-yard pass by Roeder to put the game out of reach midway

through the final quarter, but the final two plays added the final eight points in a crazy twist.

Tiger defense earned a safety as the clock ticked down and Landon Couse ran the Wolverine kickoff all the way back to add the final six points.

"The biggest improvement has been the mindset of family," Nordeen said. "They know what they want to accomplish this season and to create the standard for the Red Oak football program in the future. The younger guys are pushing the varsity guys all week long, which allows the staff to feel comfortable rotating more players on offense, defense, and special teams.

"We have made some adjustments to our offense, which has allowed us to spread the ball




